- 1. What is your personal family history? Where have you lived and with whom?
- 2. What is your academic history (schools you attended)?
- 3. Comment on any significant travel experience(s).
- 4. Which courses have you enjoyed the most? Which courses have given you the most difficulty? Elaborate as needed.
- 5. What would you like to study in college? What are your goals and aspirations for the future?
- 6. Do you consider your academic record an accurate measure of your ability and/or potential?
- 7. What sports/school/church/community clubs and/or activities have you participated in, and what contributions have you made to/through them?
- 8. What honors/achievements/memberships that you have received/been a part of are you most proud of?
- 9. What do you consider your greatest strengths? How do you know they're strengths?
- 10. What do you consider your weaknesses? What are you doing about these?
- 11. Has there been a time when you made a choice about something whether it be major or minor and it turned out differently than you anticipated? Was it a good result or bad, and what did you learn from making that choice?
- 12. Who/What is some person/thing/place that you love? Tell about it.
- 13. Finally, sum yourself up in a 25-word (or less) statement.
- 14. What are you writing about in your application essay(s)? A list is fine; you don't need to go into great detail, but do tell us. Our letters shouldn't cover the same topic(s) you're covering in your essay(s).
- 15. Many scholarships ask us to identify students with financial need. Are there any special circumstances of which we should be aware?
- 16. Is there anything about you that we need to know that hasn't already been covered?
